The First Reading

The Epistle

We did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

Notes on the Notes

Today's choral music is chosen for its connection to The Transfiguration of Jesus, described in today's gospel. Thomas Tallis's *O nata lux* is perhaps the quintessential piece of choral music for The Transfiguration; Charles Wood's *O Thou, the central orb* is commonly performed in Advent, but also has strong associations with The Transfiguration.

Today's voluntaries are by one of the leading figures in twentieth century French organ music. Jehan Alain was tragically killed in World War II at the age of only 29 but had already written some of the most strikingly original music of the twentieth century, synthesizing elements of jazz, early music, far Eastern music and dance, and more. His younger sister, Marie-Claire, lived much longer and went on to become the most recorded organist in history.

Test Your Knowledge

Why was Trinity Cathedral considered a "free church" when it was built, and what has that meant throughout the 139 years of its existence? *(answer below)*

If you'd like to learn about the history of Trinity Cathedral, the architecture of the building, and our life as a congregation today please **take a guided tour** that will start in the baptistery in the back of the church.

Answer: Charging "pew rent" was an accepted practice when the Cathedral opened its doors. When a pew was rented it was only occupied by the person who paid the rent, thus discouraging visitors. Trinity Cathedral never charged pew rent, making it truly "A House of Prayer for All People."
