Bishop Johnson Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. **Amen**.

Bishop Johnson My sisters and brothers in Christ and our friends who are with us today, the Church of Jesus Christ, which was revealed at Pentecost, lives in the faith that in every age God sustains the People of God by the power of the Holy Spirit and entrusts to the Body of Christ all the gifts on which we depend to be faithful ministers of the Gospel.

In this same trust that the One who calls us is always faithful, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit we are gathered here today to welcome the new Bishop of this diocese and to seat him in the episcopal chair of this Cathedral Church, and so continue the visible succession of the apostolic faith and order of Christ's one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church in this community.

I therefore ask the Dean of this Cathedral and these other representatives of the People of God to proceed to the West Doors of the Cathedral and admit the new Bishop.

The new Bishop knocks three times on the Cathedral doors

The Dean and the Welcoming Party process to the West Doors, which are closed. The congregation turns to face the West Doors of the Cathedral.

The Dean then opens the doors.

The new Bishop says

Open for me the gates of righteousness; I will enter them and give thanks to the Lord.

As the new Bishop moves from the Narthex into the Nave of the Cathedral, there is music

Dean Meaux Bishop Harmon, in the name of God we welcome you to your Cathedral Church, the symbol and center of your pastoral, liturgical, and teaching ministry in this diocese. Bishop Harmon blesses the People with these words

Peace be to this house, and to all who enter here.

People And also with you.

Bishop Harmon My sisters and brothers, I thank you for your welcome. I come to you now, as one whom God has ordained to be a shepherd and servant, and who has been chosen to be the Bishop of this diocese, asking to be recognized, invested, and seated in the chair that is assigned to this office.

The President of the Standing Committee then says,

Bishop Harmon, we are ready and willing to receive you.PeopleThe Lord prosper you; we wish you well in the Name of the Lord.

The Dean and the Welcoming Party lead the new Bishop to the chancel steps.

At the end of the anthem, all sit, except the new Bishop. The Dean and the Welcoming Party present the new Bishop to the Congregation,

We present to you the Right Reverend John Toga Wea Harmon to be invested for the exercise of the office for which he has been chosen.

Bishop Clark Let the will of the people here present be made known. Do you, the clergy and people of the Diocese of Arkansas, recognize and receive John as your Bishop?

Clergy and People We do.

Bishop Clark John, my brother, The Episcopal Church is part of the One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church, worshipping the one true God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, and this faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, The Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests, and Deacons.

In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation, and making him known to those in your care?

The Bible that was given to Bishop Harmon at his ordination is brought from the altar, and held before him, open to this passage which Dean Meaux reads before Bishop Harmon answers.

Jesus prayed to the Father; "I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. The glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me." *John 17:20-23*

Bishop Harmon lays his hand on the Bible, and takes this oath

Bishop Harmon I, John Toga Wea Harmon, Bishop in the Church of God, and chosen Bishop of the Diocese of Arkansas, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of The Episcopal Church bear witness; and I do solemnly promise that I shall observe, and to the utmost of my power fulfill, the responsibilities and obligations of this office, striving in all things to be a faithful shepherd to the flock of Christ. In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen**.

Bishop Sellee John, my brother, it has pleased Almighty God to call you to be the shepherd and Chief pastor of this diocese, and the clergy and people acclaimed this call in your election and have affirmed that they will receive you. I am sure that long before now you have laid to heart the high trust and weighty obligations of this office. But, in order that we may know your commitment to fulfill this trust, I call upon you in the presence of God and of this congregation to reaffirm the promises you made when you were ordained and consecrated a bishop.

Question Answer	As chief priest and pastor, will you encourage and support all baptized people in their gifts and ministries, nourish them from the riches of God's grace, pray for them without ceasing, and celebrate with them the sacraments of our redemption? I will, in the name of Christ, the Shepherd and Bishop of our souls.
Question Answer	Will you guard the faith, unity, and discipline of the Church? I will, for the love of God.
Question Answer	Will you share with your fellow bishops in the government of the whole Church; will you sustain your fellow presbyters and take counsel with them; will you guide and strengthen the deacons and all others who minister in the Church? I will, by the grace given me.

Question	Will you be merciful to all, show compassion to the poor and
	strangers, and defend those who have no helper?
Answer	I will, for the sake of Jesus Christ.

All stand.

Bishop Baxter addresses the congregation

My sisters and brothers of this diocese, by baptism you have been grafted into the community of faith, God's holy fellowship, the Body of Christ, the Church. Together with your new Bishop, you have been called to share in the Church's mission to preach the Gospel and to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ. In baptism you are fully empowered and authorized to exercise ministry in Christ's name, with mutual affection and respect, within your congregations, schools, and other ministries in the Episcopal Church in Arkansas, and in the wider Church and community.

Remember that, by the grace of the Holy Spirit, God has bestowed on the whole community of faith the necessary gifts of grace for ministry. In prayer, join with your Bishop in discerning the vision for this diocese, and in calling forth the leadership, resources, and talents that this vision requires. As you love and serve God's people, remember always to love, support, nourish, and pray for your Bishop, his family, and the members of the staff and others who serve with you and with him.

My sisters and brothers do you, in the presence of your new Bishop and the gathered Church, commit yourself to this trust and responsibility?

People	We do, firm in our trust in God's grace.
Bishop Baxter	Will you uphold John in this ministry?
People	We will.

Bishop Baxter May the Lord who has given us the will to do these things, give us the grace and power to perform them. **Amen**.

Let us now offer our prayers to God for all God's people, for the Church in Arkansas, for John, your new Bishop, and for the mission of the Church.

Touch our feet, that we may take your Good News into our neighborhoods, communities, and all parts of the world.

Touch our hands, that we may each accomplish the work you give us to do.

Hear us, O Christ.

Strengthen and encourage all who minister in your name in lonely, dangerous, and unresponsive places.

Hear us, O Christ.

Remember especially Michael, our Presiding Bishop; Justin, Archbishop of Canterbury; and all the bishops here present, that they may love and care for your people.

Hear us, O Christ.

Give your grace to John, our new bishop, and to Keeva and their family, that they may know your presence in their lives and be strengthened by your love.

Hear us, O Christ.

Open the hearts and hands of many to support your Church in this and every place. Hear us, O Christ.

Bishop Baxter says the following Concluding Prayer.

O God of unchangeable power and eternal light: Look favorably on your whole Church, that wonderful and sacred mystery; by the effectual working of your providence, carry out in tranquility the plan of salvation; let the whole world see and know that things which were cast down are being raised up, and things which had grown old are being made new, and that all things are being brought to their perfection by him through whom all things were made, your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen**.

THE SEATING AND THE GIVING OF THE PASTORAL STAFF

Bishop Baxter now addresses Dean Meaux

Dean Meaux, I now ask that you place your new Bishop in the episcopal chair that is designated to his office.

The Dean takes the new Bishop by the hand and escorts him to the cathedra. The Bishop sits, and, still holding his hand, the Dean says

In the name of the Vestry of this Cathedral Church, and on behalf of the people of this diocese, I place you, John, in the bishop's chair appointed to your office. May the Lord stir up in you the flame of holy charity, and the power of faith that overcomes the world. **Amen**.

The new Bishop stands at his chair, and the Dean presents him with the pastoral staff, saying

John, my brother, on behalf of the clergy and people of this diocese, I give into your hands this pastoral staff. May Christ the Good Shepherd uphold you and sustain you as you carry it in his name. **Amen**.

The President of the Standing Committee says

John, you have been recognized as the Bishop of this diocese. Now, by the authority committed to me, with the consent of those who have chosen you, on behalf of the Standing Committee and the clergy and people of this diocese, I invest you as Bishop of Arkansas, with all the temporal and spiritual rights and responsibilities that pertain to this office; in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen**.

The new Bishop kneels, and the Dean blesses him with these words

May the Lord preserve your going out and your coming in, from this time forth, and for evermore. **Amen**.

The new Bishop then comes to the center of the chancel, accompanied by the Dean and the President of the Standing Committee, and is joined by members of his family. The Dean and President say

My sisters and brothers, greet the new Bishop of the Episcopal Church in Arkansas and his wife, Keeva, and their children Joshua, Jarena, and Justin.

The congregation greets the new Bishop and his family with applause.

Mark 1:4-11

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. 




Celebrant It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.



Notes on the Notes: One of Bach's primary musical achievements is his synthesis of different musical styles into something greater than the sum of its parts. The most obvious trait that he borrowed from the Italian school is the use of relentless, motoric rhythms. This is taken to its maximum in his chorale prelude on Christ unser Herr zum Jordan kam, BWV 684 ("Christ our Lord came to the Jordan"), a piece in which there is no break in sixteenth-note motion from beginning to end! In this instance, the constant motion and the running bass line represent the running water of the Jordan river. This piece comes from Clavierübung III. In "Clav 3," as it is informally known, most chorales (or hymn tunes) have two preludes: one for hands and feet, and then a manualiter version (i.e. just hands). This morning's prelude consists of both, and the latter will be played on our new portative organ - its first public performance!


