It allows listeners time to meditate and transition from the busyness of the day to the peace and quiet of the evening. A major aspect of the Evensong service's structure is the balance between old and new, young and old, birth and death, and female and male. Evensong's distinguishing feature is that it consists primarily of music.

Notes on the Notes:

Written in 1917, the Études-Tableaux ("study pictures"), Op. 39 is the second set of piano études composed by Sergei Rachmaninoff. No. 2 (this evening's prelude) is also known as "The Sea and the Seagulls" and is one of many works by Rachmaninoff to quote the Dies irae (Day of Wrath) plainchant from the plainchant Requiem. No. 1 (this evening's postlude) is a disquieting piece with a relentless right hand part.
