Evensong's distinguishing feature is that it consists primarily of music.

The Nunc dimittis is the song of Simeon, an aged man promised by the Holy Spirit that he would not die until he had seen the Messiah. After taking the infant Jesus into his arms, he wrote these words of thanksgiving. (Luke 2:29-32)

Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word; For mine eyes have seen thy salvation, which thou hast prepared before the face of all people, To be a light to lighten the Gentiles, and to be the glory of thy people Israel. The Apostles' Creed intoned by the Officiant, sung by all, standing

The Apostles' Creed, the oldest profession of faith in the Christian Church and lists the primary doctrines of Christianity.

The Third Collect, for Aid against all Perils

LIGHTEN our darkness, we beseech thee, O Lord; and by thy great mercy defend us from all perils and dangers of this night; for the love of thy only Son, our Saviour, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Notes on the Notes

The *Gloucester Service* is Howells' sixth setting of the evening canticles. The Magnificat begins with one of Howells' most striking textures: a swirling trio of two soprano lines accompanied by a soprano countermelody in the organ. The *Gloucester Service* must have held special significance for Howells because he was born and raised in Gloucestershire and studied with Herbert Brewer who, at the time, was Director of Music of Gloucester Cathedral.

Likewise, Walton's *Jubilate Deo* was written for Christ Church, Oxford, where Walton had been a boy chorister and then later an undergraduate.
