Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them–though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

LUKE 5:1-11

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people." When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.

THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

If you would like to know about the Cathedral building and its history, a docent-led tour is available following the service. The tour starts in the baptistery at the back of the church.

Notes on the Notes: Malcolm Archer is one of England's most prominent church musicians. In addition to an extensive output of church music, he has held directorships at Bristol Cathedral, Wells Cathedral, St. Paul's Cathedral, and Winchester College. Bach's Toccata in C demonstrates his cosmopolitan influences. The beginning exemplifies a North German Baroque style of improvisation, (the giveaway is the extensive pedal solo; at that time, only North German organs could execute this kind of writing, and only North German organists could play it!) and the second section is in the style of an Italian concerto.

The Catechumenate

Sundays in Lent and Easter, 5 pm – 6:30 pm (beginning March 9) Lounge in Keller House

The "Catechumenate" (an ancient Greek word for "instruction") is an annual, several-weeklong process by which adults who desire a deeper life in Christ prepare for **Holy Baptism** (full initiation into the Church), **Confirmation** (for those who are baptized), **Reaffirmation** (for those who are baptized and confirmed but desire to reaffirm their faith), or **Reception** (for those who were baptized in another denomination of the Church but desire to be received into the Episcopal Church). This small group gathers weekly through Lent and Easter to share an evening meal, to pray together, and to study the Christian faith and life. The Catechumenate begins on Sunday, March 9 and the Cathedral will celebrate Holy Baptism, Confirmation, Reaffirmation, and Reception on Sunday, June 1. To learn more or to sign up, contact the Rev. 
