THE FIRST LESSON

JEREMIAH 6:9-15

Thus says the Lord of hosts: Glean thoroughly as a vine the remnant of Israel; like a grape-gatherer, pass your hand again over its branches.

THE SECOND LESSON

Mark 5:1-20

They came to the other side of the lake, to the country of ■ the Gerasenes. And when he had stepped out of the boat, immediately a man out of the tombs with an unclean spirit met him. He lived among the tombs; and no one could restrain him any more, even with a chain; for he had often been restrained with shackles and chains, but the chains he wrenched apart, and the shackles he broke in pieces; and no one had the strength to subdue him. Night and day among the tombs and on the mountains he was always howling and bruising himself with stones. When he saw Jesus from a distance, he ran and bowed down before him; and he shouted at the top of his voice, 'What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I adjure you by God, do not torment me.' For he had said to him, 'Come out of the man, you unclean spirit!' Then Jesus asked him, 'What is your name?' He replied, 'My name is Legion; for we are many.' He begged him earnestly not to send them out of the country. Now there on the hillside a great herd of swine was feeding; and the unclean spirits begged him, 'Send us into the swine; let us enter them.' So he gave them permission. And the unclean spirits came out and entered the swine; and the herd, numbering about two thousand, rushed down the steep bank into the lake, and were drowned in the lake.

Then people came to see what it was that had happened. They came to Jesus and saw the demoniac sitting there, clothed and in his right mind, the very man who had had the legion; and they were afraid. Those who had seen what had happened to the demoniac and to the swine reported it. Then they began to beg Jesus to leave their neighbourhood. As he was getting into the boat, the man who had been possessed by demons begged him that he might be with him. But Jesus refused, and said to him, 'Go home to your friends, and tell them how much the Lord has done for you, and what mercy he has shown you.' And he went away and began to proclaim in the Decapolis how much Jesus had done for him; and everyone was amazed.

Notes on the Notes: Tonight's music gives us a glimpse into the two sides of William Byrd's sacred music: the Anglican music, which he was required to write for political reasons, and the Roman Catholic music, which he wrote for religious reasons. Byrd was a recusant, meaning he was a Roman Catholic living in post-Reformation England when it was illegal to practice Roman Catholicism. Usually, the punishment for recusancy consisted of fines, property confiscation, and/or imprisonment, but in some cases, could include capital punishment. Byrd's incredible musical talent, however, saved him from the worst of these outcomes. Despite his own religious beliefs, Byrd composed a large and rich repertoire of music for the Anglican church, including tonight's "Mag and Nunc." (While Roman Catholics used these texts, they would never have used them in English, so this work is strictly Anglican.) This evening's motet, Civitas sancti tui, however, falls firmly in the Roman Catholic musical tradition. Its text is a lament on the Israelites' Babylonian exile, but Byrd and other recusants likely would have understood it as an expression of despair over the state of English Catholicism.
