THE FIRST READING

THE EPISTLE

ACTS 10:34-43

Peter began to speak to Cornelius and the other Gentiles: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ--he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

THE GOSPEL

LUKE 24:1-12

Priest People The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

On the first day of the week, at early dawn, the women who had come with Jesus from Galilee came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in, they did not find the body. While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. Notes on the Notes

Today's main effort is Mozart's *Missa brevis in F*, which the choir will perform with chamber orchestra. Typically, at Trinity, we sing congregational mass settings, but it may surprise some to know that this practice is relatively new; there is a very rich – and much longer – tradition of choral mass settings (including 18 by Mozart), intended to be sung by a choir.

You may notice a few differences in today's service due to this mass. First, in congregational masses, the Sanctus and Benedictus texts are typically combined in one short piece. In choral masses such as this one, however, they are usually separate movements. Second, nowadays, Episcopal churches often use a Fraction Anthem in place of the Agnus Dei, but tonight, the choir will sing the Agnus. Although we now sing the Fraction right before communion, the practice used to be that the Agnus was sung during communion; for this reason, these pieces could be quite extensive. So as not to prolong today's service by six minutes, we will return the Agnus to its original position.

Mozart's *Church Sonatas* (or "Epistle Sonatas") are single-movement pieces that are intended to be performed between the Epistle and Gospel readings (where we now sing the sequence hymn). Since most are written for the exact same instrumentation as today's Mozart mass (two violin parts, cello, bass, and organ), the orchestra will perform two of these pieces as today's prelude and postlude.
