THE FIRST LESSON WISDOM 7:22-8:1

Tor wisdom, the fashioner of all things, taught me. There is Γ in her a spirit that is intelligent, holy, unique, manifold, subtle, mobile, clear, unpolluted, distinct, invulnerable, loving the good, keen, irresistible, beneficent, humane, steadfast, sure, free from anxiety, all-powerful, overseeing all, and penetrating through all spirits that are intelligent, pure, and altogether subtle. For wisdom is more mobile than any motion; because of her pureness she pervades and penetrates all things. For she is a breath of the power of God, and a pure emanation of the glory of the Almighty; therefore nothing defiled gains entrance into her. For she is a reflection of eternal light, a spotless mirror of the working of God, and an image of his goodness. Although she is but one, she can do all things, and while remaining in herself, she renews all things; in every generation she passes into holy souls and makes them friends of God, and prophets; for God loves nothing so much as the person who lives with wisdom. She is more beautiful than the sun, and excels every constellation of the stars. Compared with the light she is found to be superior, for it is succeeded by the night, but against wisdom evil does not prevail. She reaches

Notes on the notes: Herbert Sumsion's final church post was Director of Music at Gloucester Cathedral, where he succeeded Herbert Brewer. Sumsion had just accepted the directorship of Coventry Cathedral, but because of Brewer's sudden death, he was released from this contract so that he could fill the vacancy at Gloucester. Interestingly, prior to this post, Sumsion worked at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. Curtis is not well-known outside of the world of classical music, but it is the most selective college in the country, offering full-tuition scholarships to all its students.

This evening's anthem is Samuel Sebastian Wesley's substantial Easter anthem, *Blessed be the God and Father*. Wesley wrote this piece for a service on Easter Day at Hereford Cathedral, when 'only Trebles and a single Bass voice' were available, the bass singer being the Dean's butler.
