THE SECOND READING HEBREWS 12:18-29

You have not come to something that can be touched, a blazing fire, and darkness, and gloom, and a tempest, and the sound of a trumpet, and a voice whose words made the hearers beg that not another word be spoken to them. (For they could not endure the order that was given, "If even an animal touches the mountain, it shall be stoned to death." Indeed, so terrifying was the sight that Moses said, "I tremble with fear.") But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, and to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.

See that you do not refuse the one who is speaking; for if they did not escape when they refused the one who warned them on earth, how much less will we escape if we reject the one who warns from heaven! At that time his voice shook the earth; but now he has promised, "Yet once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heaven." This phrase, "Yet once more," indicates the removal of what is shaken—that is, created things—so that what cannot be shaken may remain. Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us give thanks, by which we offer to God an acceptable worship with reverence and awe; for indeed our God is a consuming fire.

I present Brooks Grayson McRae, III to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

Priest Will you be responsible for seeing that the child you present is brought up in the Christian faith and life?

Parents and Godparents I will, with God's help.

Priest Will you by your prayers and witness help this child to grow into the full stature of Christ?

Parents and Godparents I will, with God's help.

The Priest asks the following questions of the candidates or of the parents and godparents.

Question Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against

God?

Answer I renounce them.

Question Do you renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures

of God?

Answer I renounce them.

Question Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God?

to the Lord?

Priest Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?

People I will, with God's help.

Priest Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every

human being?

The Priest says

Priest

Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ your Son may live in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory; who lives and reigns now and forever. **Amen**.

THANKSGIVING OVER THE WATER

The Priest blesses the water, first saying

The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Priest Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give him thanks and praise.

We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

At the following words, the Priest touches the water

Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior.

To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever. **Amen**.

THE BAPTISM

Each candidate is presented by name to the Priest, who then pours water upon the candidate, saying

N., I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen**.

Then the Priest places a hand on the person's head, marking on the forehead the sign of the cross and saying to each one

N., you are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever. **Amen**.

When this action has been completed for all candidates, the Priest, at a place in full sight of the congregation, prays over them, saying

Let us pray.

Heavenly Father, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have bestowed upon these your servants the forgiveness of sin, and have raised them to the new life of grace. Sustain them, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give them an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works. **Amen**.

When all have been baptized, the Priest says

Let us welcome the newly baptized.

Priest and People

We receive you into the household of God. Confess the faith of Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection, and share with us in his eternal priesthood.

THE PEACE

Words on the Words: This summer, our liturgy at the 10:30 a.m. celebration of the Holy Eucharist comes from Enriching Our Worship, a liturgy approved by the Episcopal Church in 1997. This liturgy offers us fresh and faithful ways to pray, drawing upon the words of scripture and early Christian tradition, while using language that reflects the full dignity of all people. It helps us name and praise God with imagery that is expansive, inclusive, and spiritually resonant for our time. We will return to Eucharistic prayers A, B, C, and D from the Book of Common Prayer in the Fall. I look forward to hearing your feedback.

Notes on the Notes: This morning's prelude consists of two chorale preludes on Luther's hymn translation of the Our Father, chosen for their relation to today's Gospel, in which Jesus institutes the Lord's Prayer. The acerbic first prelude is the most rhythmically complex piece Bach wrote for organ, as well as a tour de force of contrapuntal wizardry. The piece begins as a trio sonata, but then the chorale tune appears in canon, increasing the texture to five voices. The distinctive rhythmic feature of this piece is the short-long rhythm, called a Lombard.

This morning's postlude is a wonderfully triumphant chorale prelude based on our final hymn, I. It consists of an introduction, two statements of the hymn tune (the first of which makes me wish that I were left-handed), and a coda.

Dean and Rector Search/Recruitment Update

The Congregation Assessment Tool was recently administered at Trinity Cathedral Parish. 998 persons were invited to participate; of these, 185 persons responded. A response from every member is not required to provide valid results.

Overall, approximately 50% of your members are clearly satisfied with things in the church. This, along with other information, indicates that the church has opportunities which include growth, expansion, replication, and external impact. Whether any of these will be realized depends on the choices made.

Not every question is of equal importance to members. When asked how satisfied they are, members tend to focus on the issues addressed in the questions below. When they feel more positive in these areas, they tend to feel more positive overall.

- Persons who serve as leaders in our church are representative of the membership.
- I sense an atmosphere of genuine care and concern among our members in time of personal need.
- Our church provides opportunities for members to engage in active ministry within the church and to the world.
- Our church provides opportunities for education and formation in a variety of ways so that I can find one that fits my complex lifestyle.
- The whole spirit in our congregation makes people want to get as involved as possible.

Conversely, when your members feel less positive about the areas above, they tend to feel less satisfied with their experience in the church overall.

Every church exhibits patterns in its life that contain strengths and potential weaknesses. Our church has potential strengths related to openness and structure of religious practice. Potential weaknesses include a tendency to become tradition-bound and overwhelmed with needs.

As members look to the future, their top four goals are

- Develop and implement a comprehensive strategy to reach new people and incorporate them into the life of the church.
- Make necessary changes to attract families with children and youth to our church.
- Create more opportunities for people to form meaningful relationships (for example, small groups, nurtured friendships, shared meals, etc).
- Develop ministries that work toward healing those broken by life circumstances.

In comparison to other churches, three goals that are unusually strong for our church are

- Enlarge or improve the physical facilities of the church to expand or enhance our ministries.
- Expand outreach ministries that provide direct services to those living on the margins of society. (i.e. homeless, immigrant, transient persons)
- Strengthen the pastoral response of the church in serving people in times of need (emotional, mental, physical, spiritual, etc.).

These may warrant attention from the leadership even if they are mid-level priorities.

All the information in this report should be explored and validated in further conversation. Survey data is not the end of a conversation but the beginning.
