

A Message from the Dean about the Trinity-Bethel Covenant



The Trinity Cathedral-Bethel AME partnership goes back to 2007, the 50th anniversary of the desegregation of Central High. When Emanuel AME Church in Charleston was attacked, and nine people killed, on June 17, 2015, we were spurred to deepen our relationship. Our clergy and a few lay leaders began meeting

regularly for lunch. We started a series of book discussion groups and bible studies. Our choirs began occasionally to sing in one another's services. We have had annual joint covenant renewal service. Last April 4, we held a joint service commemorating the the fiftieth anniversary of the assassination of Dr. King. Through all of that our congregations have become friends, and our leaders have become close.

This June 17, the fourth anniversary of the Emanuel shootings, a powerful documentary will premiere, a moving testament to nine church members who were killed and to the extraordinary grace their church and families demonstrated in the aftermath. "Extraordinary" might be an understatement—the better word might be "miraculous." The film is tender, subtle, artistically beautiful and spiritually important. I know this because I have seen it. The film's producers had heard of our Trinity-Bethel partnership and they gave us special permission to see the film in advance of its premiere. The reason they did that is because they had also heard of a new project we have undertaken. We aspire to foster partnerships like ours across the city and on both sides of the river.

Our goal is to help create fourteen new partnerships across racial, ethnic or religious lines. We have invited six historically black and six predominantly white churches, along with a mosque and a temple, to find a potential partner congregation and attend a pre-screening of the *Emanuel* documentary, and a follow-up meeting about our partnership as possible model for them to use and develop as they see fit. The reception we have gotten from churches and congregations across the spectrum has been, without exception, enthusiastic.

In 2007, we started a good thing. Since then, it has deepened. And now, with God's help, it will spread, take root, and grow throughout our city!

As for *Emanuel*, the documentary, your Bethel-Trinity steering group highly recommends it. *On page 7 you will find a schedule of its public showings*. The proceeds, I am told, will go to the families of the victims.

Phyllis Raney died April 2, after a brave struggle with cancer. In his funeral homily, Dean Keller said of Phyllis: "If I were ranking my all time list of fun parishioners, Phyllis would easily make the final four, while also being among the most faithful. Sunday mornings, Phyllis would not

be deterred from coming to church, partaking of the Eucharist. Bad cancer was not near enough reason to make her miss. She came, she prayed, she went to class and paid attention."

Following the funeral, the Dean was approached by Phyllis's sons, Clay and Bob Randolph. They informed him that their mother had told told them she wished to leave a \$100,000 bequest to Trinity. Before her death, Phyllis had not had time to put that bequest in writing, meaning that her sons were under no legal obligation to either inform the Cathedral of her wish, or to fulfill it. Clay and Bob, however, wanted very much to fulfill that wish, and were happy to inform the Cathedral of it. Our hearts are warmed by Phyllis's love for the Cathedral, her desire to further its ministry, and her sons' personal integrity and loyalty to their mother and her commitments. May God bless them for it—and may Phyllis dwell forever with the saints in light!



Music News

Sunday, June 9, 2019 we celebrate Whitsunday, the Solemnity of Pentecost, on which day, according to Holy Scripture, the Spirit of God was sent as a mighty wind upon the Apostles and the Blessed Virgin gathered together, who exhibited above their heads the manifestation of the Spirit in the form of flaming tongues. Thus bathed in the Spirit, the Church's mission of evangelization was begun, the Word to be preached to all, in their own languages, throughout the world. Pentecost marks the fulfillment of our Lord's Salvation Promise first heralded by the ancient prophets, whose words we hear throughout Advent, the season of expectation, a promise made flesh in the Mystery of the Incarnation at Christmas, sacrificed upon the Cross during the Holy Triduum, risen in glory on Easter Day, then to ascend to the right hand of the Father. It is on Pentecost when we receive assurance that indeed we are not left orphans, that we, now having been granted the possibility of access to the Beatific Vision, will be accompanied throughout our days by the Advocate, the Paraclete, the Holy Spirit, who enlivens us and truly makes us capable to praise God, spread his Holy Word, and to fulfill our eternal purpose to magnify the Most High.

Pentecost is obviously no minor feast. The Solemnity stands alongside Christmas and Easter as the third of the holiest days of the liturgical year, the capstone, as it were, of our journey through salvation history. For this reason, the music of Pentecost must be especially festive, set apart from that of other days, extraordinary. Evensong, which is offered at Trinity Cathedral most Sundays at 5:00p.m. from early fall to late spring, concludes this season on Pentecost, June 9th with significant choral and organ repertoire. The organ prelude for Evensong is the Pièce Héroïque by French composer César Franck (1822-1890), a work for the instrument that expresses the drama of struggle, the refreshment of peace, and the joy of victory. The canticles are from Herbert Howells's (1892-1983) monumental setting of the Evening Service for St. Paul's. Howells, one of the greatest 20th century composers of Anglican church music, was educated at the Royal College of Music and counted among his teachers both C.V. Stanford and C. H. H. Parry. Of Howells's some twenty settings of the evening service (the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis), the St. Paul's Service is the greatest of his three most well-known settings (Gloucester and the service for King's College). It was completed December, 1950 for the choir of St. Paul's, London. The composer explained that the canticles for the London cathedral were of the most extended scale in order to fill the massive space of St. Paul's. He continues: "The climaxes are built slowly to heighten the volume of sound and a tonal opulence commensurate with a vast church." The Canticle of Mary, the Magnificat, especially conveys this quality with expansive and soaring vocal lines, its solid and stately underpinning from the organ, and captivating solo lines and interludes reminiscent of Fin-de-siècle impressionism. The Gloria Patri exhibits a static dynamic growth both from choir and organ on the final G major chord, in which sound-movement continues and builds, despite both having reached the conclusion. This is truly music composed to transmit the message of Salvation, not such with notes that merely float up and swirl about the chancel and sanctuary, but which has been conceived to be proclaimed from the choir stalls, flung down through the nave, like the ball from a cannon, with great velocity and fury, filling the space in such a away, that it overflows out through the doors and into the world: My soul doth magnify the Lord! The anthem for the day is William Henry Harrison's (1883-1959) Bring us, O Lord God, for double chorus without organ accompaniment. Harris served as organist at St. George's, Windsor, and was in the early 1940's the musical tutor of Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret. Today's anthem he composed in 1959 and remains, with its text by metaphysical poet John Donne (1572-1631), one of his most beloved. The work compliments well the glory and expansiveness of the Howells Service with its dense, eightpart texture. Harris presents us here with a prayer of the people to be admitted into the mystery of the Beatific Vision, a place of paradox beyond human understanding: "Bring us, O Lord God...to dwell in that house where there shall be...no noise nor silence... no fears nor hopes...no ends nor beginnings..." This mysterious place is indeed that which we Christians, long to attain, in which we at length may enter fully into the Trinitarian Life, itself the greatest mystery of all. The Holy Spirit and the seven-fold gifts that Spirit bestows bring this about and urge us on to transmit that message to all the world, so we may proclaim like old Simeon in the temple "For mine eyes have seen thy salvation...to be a light to lighten the Gentiles and to be the glory of thy people Israel."

The Music Department of Trinity Cathedral encourages you to attend Evensong on this solemn and celebratory day. We thank you heartily for your continued fervent support of cathedral music and wish you all blessings for Whitsuntide.
