It seems we have entered a new stage of the pandemic. The rising COVID cases, due to the Delta variant, mean we must continue many of our protective protocols. This is important to shield our children, immuno-compromised parishoners and those who cannot receive the vaccine. We will continue to wear masks during worship and maintain social distance, and for now, we will continue the distribution of bread only communion. At the same time, we are

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Seeking Stability

As I take in all that is happening: the pandemic, leadership transitions, discerning church and ministry postpandemic at Trinity, I find myself thinking about the vows people make upon entering a monastery. Though these have varying particulars across denominations and religions they share concepts of stability and transformation.

Geography and place matter in the monastic tradition. Monks take a vow of stability – to stay. Additionally, there is a vow related to transformation – fidelity and obedience to God. In our Christian perspective, as we follow Jesus our Shepherd and Model, change and risk are involved for us personally and for the church.

The monastic life is about staying put and about risking for the sake of the Kingdom of God. I feel those kinds of things are in the air at Trinity these days. I'm not saying we are a monastery, but in our religious and spiritual life we share similar values and commitments. These can inform us, motivate us, and remind us of the centrality of God in our lives.

looking into various formation opportunities in the fall, hoping to offer hybrid, virtual, and in-person options. This need for multiple modes of access is just one of the impacts of the pandemic on how the church gathers.

The Cathedral has begun to discern and imagine the future of its ministries. In the fall of 2020, we started an architectural assessment of our property. Since then, Sarah Bennings and her team from Polk, Stanley, Wilcox have done more than assess the property. They have spent time with various ministries learning how the property promotes or hinders ministry and mission. While Sarah's team was doing its work, a Mission Strategy committee explored how to deepen our relationships with our neighbors, the Little Rock community, and the Diocese. This includes the possibility of sharing our space with community partners, growing ourselves as a resource for the Diocese, and enhancing our ongoing ministries of music and education.

On August 7th, the Mission Strategy committee will gather with a broad array of Cathedral lay leaders. The purpose of this retreat is to clarify each ministry area and its priorities. We will present our work to the Parish for feedback on August 29th. The buildings across Spring Street, along with Chancellor's Hall, will be available for members to tour and learn about potential uses. All of these priorities and feedback will be used to the benefit of our Master Plan and Missional Strategy.

What will ministry at the Cathedral look like post-pandemic? There is great potential for energized ministry for our members, and with our community and Diocesan partners. This is a time for discernment, connection, and growth. I hope you will join us, sharing your gifts, passions, and vocations, as the Cathedral moves into the future.

We at Trinity are staying and moving forward for God. The church is in transition: ministry through the pandemic and beyond, staff changes, discovery of our own fidelity to values and practices, and as we move forward, we seek both stability and transformation.

Mid-Year Budget Report

Dear Cathedral Parishioners,

The following mid-year financial update is offered to keep you informed on the financial condition of the Cathedral. Dean Meaux and the Vestry feel strongly that a well-informed parish is a necessity especially during the present difficult period.

Please refer to the following table that compares our actual income and expenses through June 2021 to the same period in 2020 and to the full year 2021 budget.

Our 2021 income is below the same period in 2020 for a few important reasons:

- Income for 2020 reflects a federal Paycheck Protection Program loan of \$141,000 (reflected in the Total Other Income line). We did not apply for a similar loan in 2021.
- Little Rock Preparatory Academy was still utilizing our Spring Street classroom buildings during the first part of 2020, producing income of about \$51,000.
- At midyear, pledge income for 2021 is about 52% of total budget which is acceptable. Even though pledges are about \$90,000 behind the same period last year, we remain confident that we will achieve our pledge goal by year end.
- Contributions are only about 55% of the same period in 2020, but hopefully as we return to worship in the cathedral, this component of our income will also increase.

On the expense side, 2021 is higher than this time last year primarily in salary and benefits. This reflects our increased staffing levels over the same period last year as Dean Meaux establishes her leadership team. These changes were well understood and are reflected in the 2021 budget.

The 2021 budget does reflect a negative cash flow for the year; however, our cash balance is sufficient to manage this situation.

Fall Plan For Upper Elementary Through High School

We are excited about next steps with late elementary age children and youth for the fall! As I've been in touch with many about being volunteers, I hear your excitement as well!

We will begin to do things a bit differently this fall. We will be on-ramping 4th and 5th graders toward youth group. What this means is that each week all 4th through 12th graders will meet briefly together in Upper Mitchell house with music (Thanks to Jack Dowling and his wonderful guitar skills), nugget lesson, and sharing. From there we will split off into three groups based on both age and development: 4th and 5th graders, 6th through 9th graders, and 10th through 12th graders.

Our content will be lectionary based utilizing "Teen Text" – a resource for junior high and high school students - seeking to help "youth connect the text on the page with events in their daily life" (progressivechristianity.org/resources/teen-text-teencurriculum). This resource is highly regarded in our diocese and widely used across denominations. Additionally, it is easily adaptable to developmental age groups. The value of it in our context is its approach – it continues what children are accustomed to through Catechesis of the Good Shepherd. Teen Text does not simply provide an answer but "stimulates the learner to grapple eagerly and passionately" with scripture and today's ups and downs

I have been recruiting people to volunteer once a month on a Sunday for an hour. So far, the response has been very positive!

Pragmatically, outside of the formation hour, I will supply all volunteers with an overview resource and supplies to facilitate small group discussion, reflection, and/or craft. Preparation outside of class would be no more than 20-30 minutes.

Please let me know if you are interested in jumping in with us on this endeavor!

Flower Delivery Ministry is blooming at Trinity Cathedral ...and it begins in God's garden

The flower guild is a well-oiled machine of dedicated volunteers who assemble the beautiful floral arrangements that grace the sanctuary every Sunday and add floral beauty to special events all through the year. Each week flowers are lovingly selected and creatively arranged to enliven and enrich our worship experience. Every Sunday the flowers behind the altar are imbued with the prayers of clergy and congregation as we participate in the liturgy. The flowers are a part of our prayer and our praise. But did you know that when the Sunday service is over the flowers have more work to do?

The flower delivery ministry team takes over after the service. The beautiful bouquets are carefully disassembled and then reassembled into small floral arrangements to be delivered out into the world to persons on the prayer list, those who are sick or in need. Some go to folks in long term care, or who are home-bound and even to persons outside of the church in need. On the Fourth of July, arrangements with American flags were delivered to the Veterans Hospital in Little Rock. We have also delivered to hospitals, nursing homes, and UAMS Longevity Center entrances.

Each and every week throughout the year, 10 or more small arrangements are delivered by the team. The

flowers carry the prayers and blessings of the church with them and are shared as a reminder to the recipients, "you are loved, you are remembered, and our prayers are with you." Sometimes the vase is left on a doorstep or at the reception desk and sometimes the deliverer also visits and extends the ministry of the flowers even further.

This ministry brings a connection to the church and its people. Recipients find great joy in knowing that the church loves them and they feel connected. The flower ministers have learned that some people pass that joy on to those around them. It is with grateful hearts that our team has been given the opportunity to carry on this ministry for so many years. You can help, too! With 10 bouquets a week – you can do the math – we go through over 500 vases a year! That is a lot of small vases! The team would like for you to search your cupboards for small vases we can use for this ministry. We are a bit picky about what we need. It is a Goldilocks situation, not too big or too small. Bud vases are too small for our purposes and tall or wide vases are too big. A vase about the size of a four-cup canning jar is just right. Because of the demand for services like ours, we receive requests from all over the country from people seeking temporary housing while visiting local hospitals. The Harrison House has helped over 10,000 patients

Cool Air Returns to the Cathedral

Thanks to your help

The close of July has brought a flurry of activity to replace the damaged air-chilling unit that cools the Cathedral. With all the dedicated work we will return from our exodus to Chancellors Hall far sooner than expected.

There was big excitement on Thursday, July 22 when 17th Street was closed for a couple hours to allow the giant crane to lift the old unit up and over the Parish House and move the new unit gently into place.

The team from Middleton Mechanical Services has been very attentive and mindful of our desire to return to the Cathedral for worship by the first of August.

Parish members have been very generous in support of this project. To date, just over \$19,100 has been raised to meet the \$30,000 challenge grant. If we can complete the match, the project will be fully funded without having to access cash reserves designated for economic uncertainty.
