

Inwardly Digest

Have you ever wondered if there was some kind of guide to living a deeper, richer spiritual life that seamlessly incorporated scripture alongside the wisdom of the Church? There is – and you can find it in a pew rack near you! The Book of Common Prayer is more than a service book; it is a map to a deeper relationship with God, a framework for developing a more intentional and rewarding life of faith.

Scholar Derek Olsen explores liturgical spirituality and how the prayer book serves as a repository of Christian wisdom and spiritual practice stretching back to the beginnings of the Christian movement. Focusing on three key elements – the Calendar, the Daily Office, and the Eucharist – he discusses the spiritual principles behind them and provides clear, practical, easy-to-follow explanations of the services. These patterns of life laid out in The Book of Common Prayer serve as a guide to the spiritual life, so that we might connect back to the God who calls each of us by name and that we might love as God loves us.

This 10-week study meets in the Bishop's Conference Room Sundays at 10:15 a.m. starting January 8 and is led by the Rev. Deb Cooper and Randy Irwin.

Evensong Service

Are you interested in Education for Ministry (EfM)?



Are you interested in learning more about EfM? The Trinity Cathedral group will be taking new members starting next August. Education for Ministry (EfM) is a unique four-year distance learning certificate program in theological education based upon small-group study and practice. Since its founding in 1975, this international program has assisted more than 80,000 participants in discovering and nurturing their call to Christian service. EfM helps the faithful encounter the breadth and depth of the Christian tradition and bring it into conversation with their experiences of the world as they study, worship, and engage in theological reflection together. This is a four year program administered by the School of Theology at Sewanee. In each year you take a deep dive into a particular area - Old Testament, New Testament, Christian History, and Personal Theology. We meet weekly on Wednesday evenings from August to May, and there is a significant bit of reading each week. There is also an annual cost of \$350 that covers your reading materials.

Our meeting time is spent with some fellowship time, a brief discussion of the readings, and then a facilitated discussion called a theological reflection. Our focus as a group is going to be on theological reflection. The reading is important to build your knowledge of Christian tradition to feed these discussions, but it is not as overwhelming as a lot of people think. If you're too busy to read on some weeks, you'll still want to attend for the discussions.

The Epiphany of our Lord Jesus Christ

The twelve-day festival of our Lord's birth (December 25-January 5) is rounded off with a celebration on January 6 of Christ's manifestation to the larger world, as represented by the wise men, whose visit to the child Jesus Matthew records (2:1-12). Often this feast gets overlooked in the aftermath of Christmas, but it is one of the major feasts of the Church year. In Spain, presents are traditionally given then, when we remember the wise men's gifts, rather than on Christmas Day.

The name "Epiphany" is derived from a Greek word meaning "manifestation" or "appearing." The observance on January 6 dates from the second century in Egypt. The feast combined commemorations of the visit of the Magi (wise men); the Baptism of Jesus in the River Jordan; and Jesus' first recorded miracle, at a marriage in Cana of Galilee—all of which were seen as manifestations of the incarnate Lord. In the Eastern Churches, January 6 is still the primary feast of the Incarnation and retains the three-fold emphasis. In the Episcopal Church, we focus on the manifestation to the wise men, but in the season following the Epiphany, our Eucharistic lectionary includes readings about the other manifestations. The Sunday after the Epiphany commemorates Jesus' baptism and the story of the miracle at Cana is read on the second Sunday after the Epiphany in Year C. In a sense, therefore, the focus on the manifestation of God in the incarnate Lord extends through February 2, the Feast of the Presentation of our Lord in the Temple, when we remember Mary and Joseph presenting the Child, and Simeon and Anna recognizing him as the Messiah.

In 2017, the Epiphany occurs on Friday, January 6, and Central Arkansas Episcopalians plan a joint celebration at St. Mark's Church, Little Rock, at 7 p.m. Music will be provided by a choir drawn from the churches of the Convocation and the preacher will be Rev. Stephen Hancock from Second Presbyterian Church, Little Rock. The traditional entrance of the Three Kings forms a centerpiece of the service and the myriad candles that light up the end of the liturgy create an impressive sight as we "go into the world in the power of the Spirit." Following the service, you are invited to join us for a champagne reception in the Parish Hall.

Spotlight on Service



Spotlight on Service is a way for us to acknowledge individuals that work diligently behind the scenes to make a difference in the lives of others, both within Trinity Cathedral and in our community.

This month, we are recognizing Susan Allen. She is Chairman of the Family Ministry Committee, director of the Christmas Pageant, and has previously served on the vestry. Here is what Susan has to say about her service to Trinity Cathedral:

“Trinity Cathedral has been part of my life for as long as I can remember. The memories run deep – swinging on the Treadway House playground; singing in the Matin Choir, purple beanie bobby-pinned to my head; selling raffle

tickets for the Parish Fair; flying down the aisles in tinsel-trimmed angel wings; becoming one of the first girls ever to serve as an acolyte; meeting weekly, as a high school senior, for a breakfast Bible study with my EYC leaders; ringing with the tower bell band on my wedding day; helping my dad prepare chicken cordon bleu for 80 in the Morrison Hall kitchen; praying with clergy, in the hospital, over each of our babies; and listening to those children read from the lectern and sing from the chancel steps. The list is long, but even longer is the list of influencers behind those memories – Mary, Emma Jane, Arthurine, Charlie, Carol, Beth, Kelly, Hope, Anna, John, Tom, Greg, Marti, Otis, Dawn, Diane, Lou Ellen, Porter, Diane, Mike, Kay, Coralie, Dick, Debra, Henry, Ed, Andrea, Penny, Beth, Sandra, Elizabeth, Denise, Mary Margaret, Marcia, Jonann, Mary Starr, Jennifer... and the list goes on.

So many people have impacted and are still impacting my Christian formation just as we are each called to do every time someone is baptized in the Cathedral. ‘Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support this person in her life in Christ?’ While the answer is always the same, I’ve found there are many ways to fulfill that promise. The way that I’ve turned my ‘we will’ into action has changed over the years depending on my stage of life, my perceived gifts and the needs of the parish.

Through the years, I’ve given time to organizations including my children’s schools, Arkansas Children’s Hospital and The Centers, but my work at Trinity has been virtually uninterrupted even during the hard times – especially during the hard times. As a parent, I’ve asked myself over and over, “what do you want your kids to know?” I think the answer is simple. They need to know that they are loved – that we are each loved more than we can ever really understand.

For the last two years, I’ve steered Trinity’s Family Ministries Committee -- first, because I was asked to, and secondly, because I know that telling and retelling our story at church and at home is vital. In my experience, partnering with others in this endeavor is the way to go! Together, we find ways to minister to each other, our fellow parishioners and the community. Together, we create opportunities to be formed and transformed. The reward comes in listening to the questions and insights that our children have and, if I’m lucky, in witnessing their ‘AH HA’ moments. An example of such a moment would be when a young ‘trumpeter’ makes the connection, on Christmas Eve, that the Gospel reading is the same one recited in the Christmas Pageant. Not only that but these are the same words that Linus uses to explain the true meaning of Christmas, and they’re from the BIBLE! Imagine that! Some of these moments happen in childhood, and some don’t happen until years down the road. My hope, however, is that they all add up to provide a glimpse of that incomprehensible love that God has for his children.”


INSIGHTS Lecture Series: Marilynne Robinson

February 25, 2017



Marilynne Robinson is the recipient of a 2012 National Humanities Medal, awarded by President Barack Obama, for "her grace and intelligence in writing." She is the author of *Gilead*, winner of the 2005 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction and the National Book Critics Circle Award; *Home*, winner of the Orange Prize and the Los Angeles Times Book Prize; and *Lila*, winner of the National Book Critics Circle Award. Her first novel, *Housekeeping*, won the Hemingway Foundation/PEN Award. Robinson's nonfiction books include *The Givenness of Things*, *When I Was a Child I Read Books*, *Absence of Mind*, *The Death of Adam*, and *Mother Country*, which was nominated for a National Book Award. She teaches at the University of Iowa Writers' Workshop and lives in Iowa City.

Reading:

Lila is the third, and some have said the best, volume in Marilynne Robinson's trilogy of novels about people and life in a small town in Iowa during the Eisenhower era. The book is rich with themes of love and life, faith in its perplexities, and grace that undergirds it.



Salvation Army Ringing a Huge Success






Do you like incense?






Do you prefer to sing or say the psalm?








Do you prefer to have the congregation or the choir sing service music?

Remembering Bill Terry

William L. Terry in World War 2

The obituary for William L. Terry mentioned his 34 missions as a gunner in B-17s from March-August 1944. There is more – much more – to the story.

Bill Terry was 6'3" and a waist gunner (designed for 5'6"). In addition to the discomfort from flying at high altitude in subzero cold at an open window, he had the added strain of firing from a crouch, his head hitting the metal ceiling with each bump, as was almost continuous in rough air and common flak (anti-aircraft explosions with shrapnel).

During his training he heard the casualty reports and calculated his chances of living through his tour – in '43 and '44 “fly 25 missions and you rotate home” – but about 10% of the bombers were being shot down each mission over Europe... i.e. 10 missions and your chances were approaching 100% for death.

That changed... Bill Terry told me he owed his life to the P-47 Thunderbolt, which had the added range (with drop tanks) to escort the bombers all the way into Germany... and dropped the casualty rate much lower... but the number of missions increased.

His closest brush with death occurred just a few days before D-Day... and explains why he was on leave in England on 6 June '44. His crew drew heavy flak, which blew off both legs of the pilot. The co-pilot landed the plane, with Terry in the seat of the badly wounded pilot... carried back into the middle of the plane. The pilot died a day later. The crew was given two days “trauma” leave.

3 years later Bill and Betty – his new pride and bride – visited the parents of the dead pilot. He said to me 60 years later, “It could have been me. I’m glad it wasn’t.”
