

Inwardly Digest

Have you ever wondered if there was some kind of guide to living a deeper, richer spiritual life that seamlessly incorporated scripture alongside the wisdom of the Church? There is – and you can find it in a pew rack near you! The Book of Common Prayer is more than a service book; it is a map to a deeper relationship with God, a framework for developing a more intentional and rewarding life of faith.

Scholar Derek Olsen explores liturgical spirituality and how the prayer book serves as a repository of Christian wisdom and spiritual practice stretching back to the beginnings of the Christian movement. Focusing on three key elements – the Calendar, the Daily Office, and the Eucharist – he discusses the spiritual principles behind them and provides clear, practical, easy-to-follow explanations of the services. These patterns of life laid out in The Book of Common Prayer serve as a guide to the spiritual life, so that we might connect back to the God who calls each of us by name and that we might love as God loves us.

This 10-week study meets in the Bishop's Conference Room Sundays at 10:15 a.m. starting January 8 and is led by the Rev. Deb Cooper and Randy Irwin.

Education for Ministry (EfM) is a unique four-year distance learning certificate program in theological education based upon small-group study and practice. Since its founding in 1975, this international program has assisted more than 80,000 participants in discovering and nurturing their call to Christian service. EfM helps the faithful encounter the breadth and depth of the Christian tradition and bring it into conversation with their experiences of the world as they study, worship, and engage in theological reflection together. This is a four year program administered by the School of Theology at Sewanee. In each year you take a deep dive into a particular area - Old Testament, New Testament, Christian History, and Personal Theology. We meet weekly on Wednesday evenings from August to May, and there is a significant bit of reading each week. There is also an annual cost of \$350 that covers your reading materials.

Our meeting time is spent with some fellowship time, a brief discussion of the readings, and then a facilitated discussion called a theological reflection. Our focus as a group is going to be on theological reflection. The reading is important to build your knowledge of Christian tradition to feed these discussions, but it is not as overwhelming as a lot of people think. If you're too busy to read on some weeks, you'll still want to attend for the discussions.

Music Notes from Victoria



January 2017 was huge (as they say in sports) for the Music Department at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral. The Arkansas Symphony Orchestra' Intimate Neighborhood Concert was packed, and as I'm writing this article we are expecting big crowds for both the Howard Payne University Chorus concert on Saturday, January 28 and the Hendrix College Evensong Choir on Sunday, January 29th.

Our Seraphim choir will be singing in our 9:00 worship service on February 12th. Please join us as they offer to God a beautiful anthem "Creator of the Stars of Night". They will be joined by our Hand Bell Chamber Ringers.

February promises to be another amazing month as we prepare for General Convention and another round of work on the organ.

Speaking of the organ, I thought I'd include the paragraphs about the renovation from the Annual Report in case you didn't get that far down in my very long article.

"In October 2016, a two-phase Renovation/Restoration project for our Muller Pipe Organ was approved by the Vestry which will ensure the longevity of our organ in its role to support congregational and choral singing. After two lightning strikes during the spring and summer, issues with voicing, pipe placement, chamber temperatures, and pipe deterioration were detected. A two-phase project (\$100,000 per phase) was recommended and the firm of Burton K. Tidwell, Organbuilder LLC was hired. Phase One funding was allocated by the Vestry and work began in December 2016 with projected completion scheduled Easter 2017.

Approval was also given to embark upon the second phase as soon as funding became available. Jack Harvey graciously and generously accepted the task of leading the campaign to fund Phase Two. The funding for this phase will be raised from music department projects (Madrigal Feaste raised \$8,500), designated memorial gifts and a Keyboard Tribute Offering whereby parishioners and members of the community can memorialize or honor loved ones by "purchasing" note(s) on the organ. A lottery and other fund raisers are also being planned. Gifts in honor of former Cathedral Musicians Charlie Rigsby and Craig Chotard have already been received so the possibility of beginning Phase Two immediately after the completion of Phase I is very real."

The organ technicians will be back the week after General Convention. They are preparing new pipes and footings while they are away so that work will proceed quickly upon their return. In case you haven't noticed, there are pipes and chests scattered throughout the Cathedral. We appreciate your patience during this construction period. We are also grateful for the gifts already received towards paying for the second phase.

If any of you have questions or would like to experience the already-noticeable changes in our instrument through a guided tour, just let your musicians know. We're thrilled and we hope you will be too.

Marilynne Robinson is the recipient of a 2012 National Humanities Medal, awarded by President Barack Obama, for "her grace and intelligence in writing." In 2013 she was awarded South Korea's Pak Kyong-ni Prize for her contribution to international literature. She is the author of <u>Lila</u>, a finalist for the National Book Award and the National Book Critics Circle Award, <u>Gilead</u>, winner of the 2005 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction and the National Book Critics Circle Award, and <u>Home</u>, winner of the Orange Prize and the Los Angeles Times Book Prize, and a finalist for the National Book Award. Her first novel, <u>Housekeeping</u>, won the Hemingway Foundation/PEN Award. Robinson's nonfiction books include <u>The Givenness of Things</u>, <u>When I Was a Child I Read Books</u>, <u>Absence of Mind</u>, <u>The Death of Adam</u>, and <u>Mother Country</u>, which was nominated for a National Book Award. She lives in Iowa City where she taught at the


University of Iowa Writers' Workshop for twenty-five years.

Mardi Gras Celebration and Gumbo Cook-off
