




Inwardly Digest

Have you ever wondered if there was some kind of guide to living a deeper, richer spiritual life that seamlessly incorporated scripture alongside the wisdom of the Church? There is – and you can find it in a pew rack near you! The Book of Common Prayer is more than a service book; it is a map to a deeper relationship with God, a framework for developing a more intentional and rewarding life of faith.

Scholar Derek Olsen explores liturgical spirituality and how the prayer book serves as a repository of Christian wisdom and spiritual practice stretching back to the beginnings of the Christian movement. Focusing on three key elements – the Calendar, the Daily Office, and the Eucharist – he discusses the spiritual principles behind them and provides clear, practical, easy-to-follow explanations of the services. These patterns of life laid out in The Book of Common Prayer serve as a guide to the spiritual life, so that we might connect back to the God who calls each of us by name and that we might love as God loves us.

This 10-week study meets in the Bishop's Conference Room Sundays at 10:15 a.m., January 8 - March 26, and is led by the Rev. Deb Cooper and Randy Irwin.

Evensong Service

Evensong is Sundays at 4:00 p.m. This sung service of evening prayer offers music and readings in praise of God by the Cathedral Schola choir. It begins with an organ prelude (there is no sermon) and ends with an elegant high tea in Baker Parlor.

Education for Ministry (EfM) is a unique four-year distance learning certificate program in theological education based upon small-group study and practice. Since its founding in 1975, this international program has assisted more than 80,000 participants in discovering and nurturing their call to Christian service. EfM helps the faithful encounter the breadth and depth of the Christian tradition and bring it into conversation with their experiences of the world as they study, worship, and engage in theological reflection together. This is a four year program administered by the School of Theology at Sewanee. In each year you take a deep dive into a particular area - Old Testament, New Testament, Christian History, and Personal Theology. We meet weekly on Wednesday evenings from August to May, and there is a significant bit of reading each week. There is also an annual cost of \$350 that covers your reading materials.

Our meeting time is spent with some fellowship time, a brief discussion of the readings, and then a facilitated discussion called a theological reflection. Our focus as a group is going to be on theological reflection. The reading is important to build your knowledge of Christian tradition to feed these discussions, but it is not as overwhelming as a lot of people think. If you're too busy to read on some weeks, you'll still want to attend for the discussions.

Lenten Quiet Day with Alan Jones on March 18

"It's Time to Get Our Souls Back: Stories That Make Us Human! A Fresh Look at What Defines Us"

We are excited to announce that the Very Rev. Alan Jones, Dean Emeritus of Grace Cathedral, San Francisco, will be with us for a weekend of teaching, preaching, and conversation this Lent. It starts Saturday morning, March 18, with a Quiet Day at the Cathedral from 9:00 a.m. to noon. Here is a preview of what will be discussed:

Ram Dass: "When all is said and done, we're just all walking each other home."

"You get old, and you realize there are no answers, just stories." Garrison Keillor. The trouble is that there are conflicting stories with bloody consequences. How do we choose? Kitty Oppenheimer – "The universe is made up of stories not atoms."

George Orwell saw the *absence of soul* in himself and the people around him – writing at the end of the 1930s (another ominous time for the world), he conjures up tea in the garden on a hot summer afternoon.

"I thought of a rather cruel trick I once played on a wasp. He was sucking jam on my plate, and I cut him in half. He paid no attention, merely went on with his meal, while a tiny stream of jam trickled out of his severed esophagus. Only when he tried to fly away did he grasp the dreadful thing that had happened to him. It is the same with modern man. The thing that had been cut away is his soul, and there was a period – twenty years, perhaps – during which he did not notice it."

Now, we're noticing the "absence of soul." Orwell writing in "The Road to Wigan Pier" (1937) pointed out the weakness of a Socialism, committed, as it claimed, to justice and liberty but also to seeing the world only through the eyes of economics and the hope of a materialistic Utopia. Its great weakness was that it "proceeded on the assumption that man has no soul." On the other side, we see the weakness and terror of Fascism coming from the Right, which offers tyranny in exchange for safety – it plays upon our need for authoritarian nationalism.

Yet people long for soul, that is, for responsibility for their lives because they are of infinite worth, even if they daren't believe it. Even as they don't know how to go about having a soul. Religion is vital because it provides the window of transcendence – in spite of its failures, it opens us up to a deeper reality.

Mary McCarthy's reaction to Hannah Arendt's "Eichmann in Jerusalem" (1963) is telling. She found it "morally exhilarating. I freely confess that it gave me joy and I too heard a paean in it – not a hate-paean to totalitarianism but a paean to transcendence, heavenly music, like that of the final chorus of Figaro or the Messiah. As in those choruses, a pardon or redemption of some sort was taking place." Evil cannot and must not be sentimentalized or whitewashed but neither should it be thought of as inevitable. To acknowledge that you have a soul is to know that compassion and forgiveness, love and redemption have the last word. These are the values we need to inject into our political discourse.

Having a soul is a way of talking about the call to be human. Being human isn't simply a biological fact; it's a vocation, a skill. It's a question of how you see the world and interpret it. What's happening to and in the world? It's looking for its soul. We're looking for ours! Looking for our common humanity. And war and violence – even in the midst of their horror – show up in stark detail our common humanity.

There are two principles hidden in the stories we tell in the Church. The first is, there's no private deal. Poet and philosopher Charles Péguy asks us, "What is the first question God will ask us when we get to heaven?" "Where are the Others" Où sont les autres? The second principle is one of total inclusion. James Joyce's definition of the Catholic Church – "Here comes everybody!" Two great doctrines! "Everybody matters" and "We're in this together." It's a way of affirming the sacred at the heart of things – and affirming that we are not hated and abandoned – that God is with us. Good News!

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday is the first of forty days of Lent, a period of penitence and renewal in preparation for Easter, our greatest feast. The season of Lent begins on a Wednesday and includes all days leading up to Easter, except Sundays. (All Sundays of the year are feasts of the Resurrection!) This year, Lent begins on March 1 and ends with Easter Eve, April 15, and Easter Day, April 16.

The Book of Common Prayer provides a beautiful, if somber, liturgy for the first day of Lent on pp. 264-269. We will celebrate this, along with Holy Communion, three times at Trinity on March 1: at 7:30 a.m., 12:15 p.m., and 6:30 p.m. As the Prayer Book says, we gather on this special day to make "a right beginning of repentance," which means a beginning of a turning around in our lives, more toward God and toward what God wants for us. The ashes imposed on our foreheads remind us of our mortality, but also of how God is an expert at bringing dust to life (see the book of Genesis!).
