OCTOBER 8 IS ‘FRIED CHICKEN LISTENING SUNDAY!’

Don’t miss the “Eat up—Speak up Fried Chicken Brunch!”

At Trinity Cathedral, we are committed to asking “What is God calling our parish to be and do?” In order to faithfully answer that question, we have hired the Episcopal Church Foundation to lead us through a time of listening together. On Sunday October 8, we will all come together to ask questions about our core values, our collective vision, and strategies for moving forward as a parish.

Your participation will be critical to the success of process. All will be invited to share and our leadership is committed to listening to you.

Where and When: Sunday morning October 8 in Chancellor’s Hall (the gym). As we do in January for the Annual Meeting, we will gather in Chancellor’s Hall following the 9:00. service. We should start around 10:15, eating and talking at the same time. We will wrap up around 11:45.

About the food: It’s catered fried chicken for breakfast, and its good! Trinity will also provide the bread. For the sides, its potluck. If your last name begins with:

- A-R: please bring a side or salad
- S-Z: please bring a dessert

About kids: Our high school leaders and their sponsors will take the younger kids for food, fun, and games on the playground. Rainy weather? No problem! The fun will move inside to Morrison Hall. (Our youth groups will have their own special EYC meetings to offer their contributions to the listening process.)

These are our “Strategic Listening Questions”

1. When thinking about Trinity Cathedral at its best, would you please describe one or two events or moments that reflect this.
2. As Trinity Cathedral makes decisions about its future and ministry for the next five to ten years, what would you like to communicate to the leadership during this process? What do you hope and dream for Trinity for the next five years? Ten years?
3. When thinking about visitors and newcomers to Trinity, what has kept you coming back to Trinity and its faith community?
4. What do you see as the role of Trinity Cathedral in The Episcopal Diocese of Arkansas? How would you like for Trinity to serve the diocese?
5. What structural improvements and/or additions would you like to see to the Trinity Cathedral complex?

Some questions you might have for us about the strategic planning process:

What will be the results of this listening exercise?

We will identify our key core values, determine our strategic goals for the future, and identify the resources necessary to live fully into this mission.

How is this different from the kind of guided processes we have undergone in dean and rector searches?

We are not looking for a Dean, because we have one: Dr. Keller. Since his arrival we’ve seen changes both in our parish and larger community. Our goal now is to ask not who we need to lead our parish, but who are we called to be in the next few years.

Why engage in external consulting?

We are committed to a safe and healthy process for listening to one another and the Holy Spirit. Utilizing an external consultant allows for all participants to engage and to be heard, while also ensuring that the process will stay on schedule and reach completion.

Why the Episcopal Church Foundation?

The Episcopal Church Foundation has been working with Episcopal Churches, Diocese and other entities since 1948. Donald Romanik, President, and Erin Weber-Johnson, Program Direction of Strategic Solutions, are experienced in guiding parishes, like ours, through strategic listening processes. They are good people, they love the Episcopal church, and they know what they are doing.

THOUGHTS ON STEWARDSHIP

I find myself wishing that everyone at Trinity Cathedral could share my exposure to the many grace-filled moments I witness in the course of our ministry. I saw the formation and strengthening of Christian community and of individual spiritual lives when 25 of us ventured around holy sites in England this summer. In the many pastoral care “touches” that our clergy and over 30 lay team members accomplish, bonds are strengthened with those who cannot come to church or who have experienced particular difficulties or joys. Many who receive pastoral care attest that they find life-giving connections to God and others through Trinity. We see eyes opened to new insights through lectures, sermons, and classes. The hungry are fed through our outreach ministries, sometimes with real food, as at the Stewpot ministry and St. Francis House, and sometimes with other forms of nurture, such as our Arts Outreach program with students at Little Rock Preparatory Academy. Hearts are warmed and spirits soar when we hear and make fine music, offered to the glory of God. One could go on with such listing indefinitely. These activities and many more build us up, connecting us with God and neighbor.

When we think of stewardship—the commitment of time, talent, and financial resources to support the life and ministry of Trinity Cathedral—we should have these results in mind. We do not give primarily to “meet a budget.” We give in order to support ministry, which brings new life and peace. Thanks be to God for all we have to celebrate here at Trinity.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd – Children’s Formation



Our Sunday morning programs are off to a great start. All three atria (classrooms) were prepped and readied for our children. Thanks to our parents and catechists who came in and cleaned and reorganized everything. The Level 1 Atrium (3 year olds-1st grade) have started the year with the basics: how do we walk in the atrium?, how do we talk in the atrium? They have also started some practical life lessons. This includes things like spooning beans, pouring water through a funnel or into a different vessel, using a sponge. While these lessons are not explicitly religious, they help set the stage for prayerful work throughout the year.

Practical life develops concentration. Simple exercises invite the child to repeat the movement until they are satisfied. This may be a few times or many times. The freedom to work with one material as long as desired fosters longer and longer periods of concentration.

Practical life develops independence. Exercises such as hand washing, sweeping, sorting, polishing or table cleaning allow the child to take address any accidents related to their work independently. If something spills, the child can calmly wipe or sweep as needed. If a pencil needs to be sharpened, the child can do so without waiting for an adult to help them.

Practical life prepares the child for care of the atrium and for particular atrium materials. For example, cloth folding prepares for the work of folding altar cloths or chasubles.

We are having a great time. Please join us in the atria – it is never too late to begin nurturing your child’s spiritual journey.

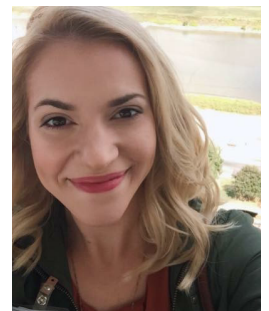

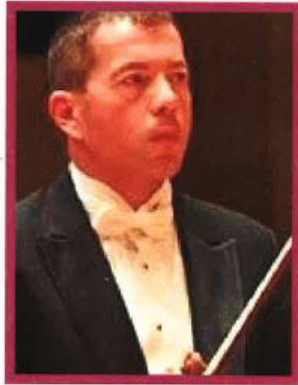

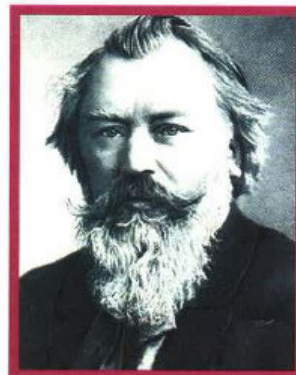
