Lent is here! This is a special season that prepares us to encounter Christ's resurrection at Easter.

The word Lent in its root meaning is "spring." Springtime is a time of life, of new beginning. This life and new beginning are found as we focus on sin and death and the need for forgiveness...the making of right relationship. Here we find a contrast; life and new beginning found through a focus on sin and death. Through this focus we move to reconciliation with God, self, and others. From separation to union.

As we move through Lent together at Trinity, during our Sunday 9:00 and 11:15 a.m. services, we will be using Rite I Eucharist. This older Elizabethan language, in its poetic semantic, provides avenue for reflection. Special music will include Bairstow's famous "Lamentations", Kenneth Leighton's masterpiece "Drop Drop Slow Tears", and Sumsion's "There is a Green Hill." At Easter, we will feature the Pinnacle Brass Quintet in Bairstow's "Sing Ye to the Lord." Musically, the Lenten season is a unique opportunity as foci on sin, Christ's suffering, and death.

Lent is LONG! Lent is 40 days long plus the six Sundays before Easter. This season is about ordered self-control to let go of something that may draw our heart from God and pick up something that may draw us toward God.

Trinity's annual adult Confirmation Class will meet on Wednesdays in Lent and Eastertide this year from 6:15 to 7:15 p.m. in the Conference Room. Sessions will run from February 21 through May 16, with the exception of the Wednesday in Holy Week, which is March 28.

This class, led by the Rev. Canon Dr. Russ Snapp with assistance from other leaders of Trinity, both clergy and lay, is primarily intended for 1) baptized adults considering membership in the Episcopal Church; 2) baptized adult members who have not yet been confirmed or received by the Bishop as members of the Episcopal Church; and 3) adults desiring to be baptized, as well as confirmed, in the Episcopal Church. The class is also open to those already baptized and confirmed who wish to join others in strengthening their knowledge of the Christian faith and of our Anglican tradition, with the possibility of reaffirming their faith before the Bishop. We will celebrate Confirmation, Reception, and Reaffirmation at the Bishop Benfield's visitation on the Day of Pentecost, which falls this year on May 20.

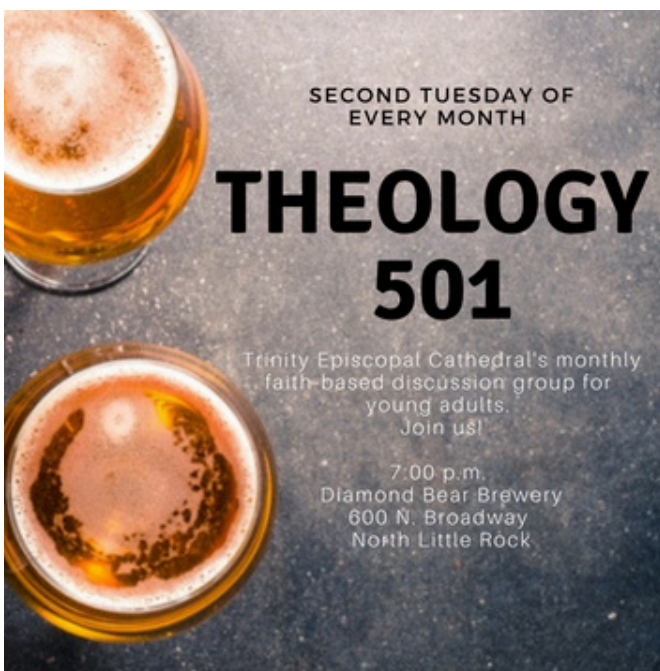

Why Purple for Lent? Purple is for Preparation

In both the Old and New Testament, purple is found to be a rare and valuable color symbolizing royalty, wealth and status. In ancient times, the dye used to create purple was not only very expensive to produce, but it was also labor intensive. It was considered a great luxury. In the Hebrew Scriptures, it was worn by kings, used in curtains and carpets in the tabernacle, adorned the altar in the temple and was repeatedly shown to be a costly linen. In the gospels, the Roman soldiers dress Jesus in a purple robe before he begins his walk to Calvary. Each Lent, we are called as his disciples, to walk with him on this journey. How do we speak of this to the children?

We know that young children are very sensitive to and have a great interest in colors. When they are small, children enjoy identifying their favorite color. They take great delight in finding their favorite color in the clothes they wear, the food they eat and items discovered in their environment. For the very young child, colors help offer shape and identity. In the Atrium, we speak about purple as the color for waiting and preparing. Through the presentations of the Liturgical Colors, and later The Liturgical Calendar, the child discovers that the season of Lent is a time of preparation for the great feast of Easter. Through these presentations, along with the solemn changing of the color of the cloth on the prayer table, the children come to participate in the liturgical life of the Church.

Mite Boxes & Lenten Meditations Available

Located in the back of the church is a book of Lenten Meditations from Episcopal Relief & Development for you to use as part of your daily devotions. There are also Mite Boxes (Hope chests) available for you to use to collect funds for ERD that will be collected on Easter Sunday. Traditionally mite boxes are collected by the church, and the donations are given to the poor. Mite boxes, named for the story of the “widow’s mite”, (Luke 21: 1-4) are often used by churches to encourage children and others to give offerings of their coins and small change. Contemporary mite boxes are usually made of cardboard and given out to church congregations during the Lenten season.

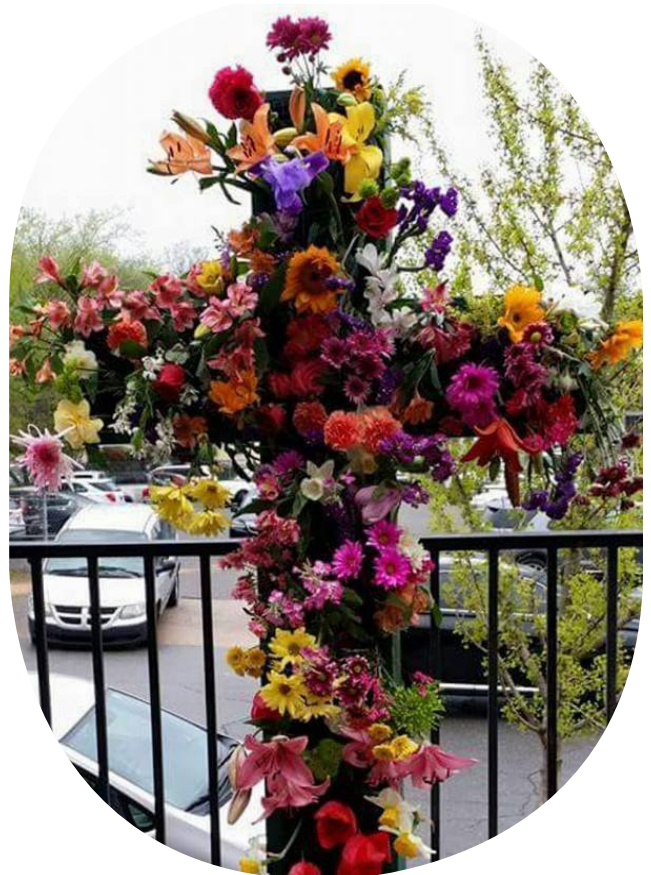
