Notes on the Notes

Today's sequence hymn, *Hills of the North, rejoice*, is not in the 1982 hymnal but certainly deserves to be. It is a stirring tune and evocative text announcing Christ's coming to all four corners of the world: one verse for each cardinal direction, plus a final verse for the whole world.

Today's voluntaries are Advent-themed chorale preludes by J.S. Bach taken from his set of six Schübler Chorales. This set of pieces comprises organ transcriptions of movements that Bach originally wrote for various combinations of singers and instrumentalists. As one might imagine, these arrangements can create problems when translated to an instrument for which they were not written. In the case of the postlude, what was a perfectly reasonable violin part translates into dreadfully unidiomatic keyboard writing for the right hand. Since this piece's bass line is quite active, Bach chooses to put it in the left hand instead of the pedal (which usually plays the lowest voice). One might perceive this as a small act of mercy until one realizes that the feet are the only limbs still available to play the hymn tune, complete with many ornaments, frills, and trills.

Last, there are some changes to the service now that we are in Advent. To most of the world, Advent is just pre-Christmas, so it is easy to forget that in our tradition, Advent is a penitential season. (Indeed, the traditional sermon topics for the four Sundays of Advent used to be death, judgment, heaven, and hell – a far cry from pre-Christmas!) For this reason, we will sing the Kyrie instead of a Gloria, and the choir will switch to more austere – but equally beautiful – plainsong psalms, rather than their usual Anglican chant.
