Notes on the Notes:

Howell's *Master Tallis's Testament* blends elements of Renaissance harmony with Howell's own distinctive twentieth-century compositional idiom. Herbert Murrill is somewhat of a one-hit wonder, known almost exclusively for his Magnificat and Nunc dimittis in E major, performed tonight. Charles Villiers Stanford's *Pray that Jerusalem* is a simple but moving setting of Psalm 122, verses 6-9 based on the 17th century Scottish psalm tune *New London*.
